

Fact Sheet: Evatt List & Magellan List

Risk

Evatt List: if your matter is put in the Evatt List, it means it has been determined by the Court to be high risk. Extra resources will be allocated to assist you in moving through the family courts more safely and quickly. You will be working with court staff who have had extra training with high risk matters.

- 1. Within 5-10 days of referral, an Evatt List Registrar will look at the documents and set a date for your first court event.
- 2. Within 6-8 weeks, you will have your first court event. At this court event, the Registrar may make orders for reports or mediations to occur.
- 3. Within 10-12 weeks, you'll have an interim hearing to determine any urgent issues.
- 4. Within **6-8 months**, the Registrar will check the outcomes of any mediation or court ordered reports, and how the interim orders are operating.
- 5. Within **10 months**, your matter will be set down for a hearing.
- 6. Within **1 year**, you'll have a hearing in front of a Judge

Sometimes, the Court may not put your matter in the Evatt list even though you consider your matter to be high risk. We do not know why some matters are considered high risk and others are not. You can still get support if you are worried about your safety at Court. You can call the court on 1300 352 000 to organise supports like access to a safe room at Court, attendance via the phone or video link, or support from a
